Why has the County Council increased my Council Tax?

Given the funding pressures East Sussex County Council is facing, after careful consideration, the County Council has decided to increase its element of Council Tax in 2020/21 by 1.99% in order to protect the County Council's ability to provide its services now and in the future. These increases are shown on your Council Tax bill.

What is the Adult Social Care Precept?

A growing pressure for county councils with responsibilities for adult social care is the increase in demand that the ageing population brings. In order to ensure that the responsible councils are able to respond to this rising demand the Government has allowed those authorities with Adult Social Care responsibilities to increase council tax by an additional 2.00%.

The additional funds raised by the Adult Social Care precept are ring-fenced to be spent only on adult social care, for example supporting people in care homes or to continue to live independently in their own homes.

The information presented on my bill is confusing?

The information contained in the 2020/21 council tax bill is required to be presented in a certain way by The Council Tax (Demand Notices) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2020 set out by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG).

Why is my bill different to the amount shown on the council tax leaflet?

The charge shown on the council tax leaflet is the East Sussex County Council element of the council tax charge. In addition to this on your council tax bill, there will be charges for your borough or district council, the Police and Crime Commissioner, the Fire Authority and, where applicable, your town and parish council.

Why do I have to pay for services I don't use?



The council tax is not a charge for services, it is a tax. The tax system is centrally prescribed by Government and local authorities have no power to change the way it operates. The only body that can make changes is the Government. As such, the current system will remain in place until the Government decides changes are necessary.

Why is my bill showing 3.99% general increase but if I calculate it, it is more than 3.99%?

The 3.99% is an increase on the total amount for last year (general plus adult social care precept). The table below shows if you add the two ESCC elements from your 2019/20 bill and compare it to the total ESCC elements from 2019/20, the increase is 3.99%.
